Māori pre-governance leadership programme 2018

This 5-day programme will introduce emerging Māori leaders to leadership tools drawn from different Māori, non-Māori and global settings. Participants will examine how leadership themes link back to their own tribal, Māori land trust or company workplace strategy and culture. The programme will prepare them for the expectations of Māori governance roles in the future. It is provided in partnership between Te Pūtea Whakatupu Trust, the Federation of Maori Authorities and the Victoria University of Wellington.

Programme Themes

1. The Māori Economy and the Government Environment – identifying the differences
2. Māori Governance Structures and Roles – navigating the landscape
3. Strategic Leadership – navigating for the future
4. Legislation and Resource Management – navigating and improving systems
5. People Leadership – identifying and developing talent
6. Delivery Management and Strategic Execution – making it happen
7. Stewardship – ethics and transparency
8. Negotiation Skills – focus on negotiation dynamics within Māori entities
9. Communication Skills – identifying communication channels and networking

(Themes will be interwoven through and with ngā āhuatanga Māori)

Project Work

Participants will be asked to prepare a short brief about an issue or problem related to Māori governance, prior to the programme. This will be discussed during the programme and participants will present on the brief at the conclusion of the programme. A follow-up video conference will be convened to discuss how participants have identified and worked on their action plans for future governance roles.
